WE IDENTIFIED HOTSPOTS THERE AND SO FOR EXAMPLE THE VERY FIRST MEASURES WE TOOK WHEN THE CHIEF

WAS STILL THE COMMISSIONER OF THE PARKS DEPARTMENT WAS TO PUT A DEPLOYABLE FLOOD WALL, FLOOD BARRIER IN EAST BOSTON, SO WE COULD ADDRESS THE IMMEDIATE RISK THAT WE DETECTED. AND AS ACCOMPANIED BY LONGER

AND AS ACCOMPANIED BY LONGER TERM PLANS AND INVESTED IN MORE COMPREHENSIVE AND FAR REACHING WAYS.

THE NEIGHBORHOOD PLANS FOR DOWNTOWN AND NORTH END AND FOR DORCHESTER WILL BE COMING OUT WE EXPECT LATER THIS YEAR AND YOU CAN SEE VERY DETAILED -- IN THOSE NEIGHBORHOODS IN ADDITION A DETAILED TIMELINE OF WHERE WE HAVE TO TAKE ACTION AND HOW IT RELATES TO THE WHOLE SET OF ACTIONS WE ARE TAKING ACROSS THE CITY.

I WOULD ALSO SAY THAT, YOU KNOW, WE ARE VERY MINDFUL THAT WE HAVE TO THINK ABOUT THE HOTSPOTS AS IT WERE FOR THE HEAT WAVES AND -- AND WE ARE WORKING VERY CLOSELY WITH OUR COLLEAGUES WITH BOSTON WATER AND SEWER COMMISSION TO THINK ABOUT OTHER CRITICAL WAYS TO TAKE ACTION WITH MORE INTENSE RAINFALL THAT IS HAPPENING.

>> THANK YOU VERY MUCH, COMMISSIONER AND THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

YOU HAVE ALWAYS BEEN VERY RESPONSIVE AND I AM EXCITED TO SEE THE LINE ITEM FOR CLIMATE RESILIENCY IN THE BUDGET AND IF WE HAVE A SURPLUS WE WOULD ASK THAT NUMBER A LITTLE BIT -- AROUND 5 MILLION, IT IS AT 3 MILLION NOW.
BUT JUST FOOD FOR THOUGHT IF

BUT JUST FOOD FOR THOUGHT IF SOME MONEY CAN BE DEFLECTED TO THE COVID-19 RESPONSE IF NECESSARY, GREAT, OTHERWISE -- AN OPPORTUNITY TO PUMP UP THE CLIMATE RESILIENCY FUND. SO THANK YOU FOR ALL THAT YOU DO FOR OUR CITY AND THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

>> GREAT.

THANK YOU SO MUCH, COUNCILOR

FLAHERTY. NEXT UP IS COUNCILOR FLYNN AND THEN COUNCILOR BAKER AND THEN COUNCILOR O'MALLEY. COUNCILOR FLYNN. >> THANK YOU COUNCILOR BOK AND THANK YOU TO THE COMMISSIONER AND THE CHIEF AND THE DEDICATED STAFF FOR THE ENVIRONMENTAL DEPARTMENT. WE APPRECIATE THE EXCELLENT WORK THAT YOU ARE DOING. I KNOW YOU TALKED ABOUT THE I AM GLAD YOU MENTIONED THE WATER AND SEWER DEPARTMENT PLAYING A KEY ROLE AS WELL AS IT RELATES TO THE ISSUES OUT OF THE FOUR-POINT. THAT IS A CRITICAL DEPARTMENT, NOT ONLY IN THE FOUR-POINT AREA BUT IN THE SOUTH END, ESPECIALLY, AS IT RELATES TO CLIMATE RESILIENCY .. AND IN THOSE CHANGES. WHAT TYPE OF OUTREACH ARE YOU DOING WITH THE WATER AND SEWER AND HOW IS THAT GOING? >> HOW IS THAT COMMUNICATION GOING? >> >> WELL, WE DON'T -- WE DO A LOT OF COORDINATION WITH WATER AND SEWER. AT THE END WE HAVEN'T DONE ANY JOINT OUTREACH, SO THEIR REPRESENTATIVE OF WATER AND SEWER OFTEN PARTICIPATE IN FOR EXAMPLE THE NEIGHBORHOOD OPEN HOUSES THAT WE HAVE HAD AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD PLANS THAT WE WE ARE DEVELOPING AND SOME OF WHICH YOU HAVE ATTENDED, OF COURSE, COUNCILOR. SO WE HAVE, AGAIN, A VERY ACTIVE AND ROBUST COORDINATION AND COOPERATION AND EVEN IN THE PLANNING EFFORT WITH WATER AND SEWER. THEY HAVE BEEN A PART OF OUR CLIMATE PLANNING EFFORTS FOR A DOZEN YEARS AND WE HAVE INVOLVED

THEM IN THE DETAILED PLANNING BECAUSE OF THE IMPORTANCE NOT JUST SEPARATELY OF FLOODING FROM PRECIPITATION BUT HOW THAT COULD INTERACT WITH COASTAL FLOODING AND BECAUSE THE MEASURES THAT WE ARE TAKING TO ADDRESS ANY FLOODING FROM PRECIPITATION OFTEN LOOK AT GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE. WHICH IS ALSO IMPORTANT IN ADDRESSING THE EFFECTS OF HEAT. SO IT IS A VERY MULTIDIMENSIONAL COORDINATION OF OUR WORK WITH WATER AND SEWER AND OF COURSE OTHER DEPARTMENTS TOO. >> THANK YOU. THAT'S HELPFUL. I AM ALSO GLAD YOU MENTIONED THE GROUNDWATER TRUST. THAT'S ALSO ANOTHER IMPORTANT AGENCY, SO I WOULD LIKE TO TALK TO YOU MORE, YOU KNOW, MORE OVER THE NEXT COUPLE OF MONTHS ABOUT THOSE TWO AGENCIES AND HOW WE CAN CONTINUE TO WORK TOGETHER. AND I KNOW YOU WORK ON OTHER ISSUES, ESPECIALLY AIR POLLUTION, THAT'S AN ISSUE I FOCUSED ON OVER THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS. NOISE POLLUTION AS WELL IS A CRITICAL FUNCTION OF THE DEPARTMENT. I WAS WITH CHIEF COOK IN CHINATOWN LAST SUMMER WHEN THE UNITED SCIENCES COMPLETED A STUDY AND SAID CHINATOWN HAS THE HIGHEST RATE OF AS MARKS RESPIRATORY ISSUES OF ANY NEIGHBORHOOD IN THE STATE. SO AIR POLLUTION IS A CRITICAL ISSUE FOR ME, BECAUSE IT IS AN IMPORTANT ISSUE FOR MY CONSTITUENTS AND IN THAT AREA ALONG ANDREW SQUARE AND IN SOUTH BOSTON AND DORCHESTER, HAVE BEEN TO ROXBURY A LITTLE BIT, THAT IS ANOTHER KEY CRITICAL AREA. SO I JUST WANT TO KNOW WHAT ARE SOME OF THE INITIAL IT WAS YOU WOULD LIKE TO WORK ON AS IT RELATES TO THE AIR POLLUTION? >> SO RL KARL. IF IT IS ALREADY I WILL JUMP IN BRIEFLY AND PERHAPS YOU CAN TALK ABOUT THE

AIR POLLUTION CONTROL

COMMISSION. BUT JUST TO REITERATE WHAT YOU SAID, COUNCILOR, THE ADMINISTRATION HAS BEEN ON RECORD PUBLICLY. WE ARE IN COMPLETE DISAGREEMENT AND IN FACT OPPOSITION TO THE DEREGULATION THAT EPA HAS TAKEN ON AIR QUALITY STANDARDS. WE THINK IT IS THE WRONG MOVE FOR THE PRESIDENT TO TAKE THAT ACTION AND SO WE HAVE PUBLICLY OPPOSED THAT, NOT ONLY AS PART OF OUR MEMBERSHIP AS CLIMATE MAYORS BUT ALSO REACHING OUT TO THE BOSTON DELEGATION AS WELL, AND FOR THE VERY REASONS YOU JUST SAID THAT, YOU KNOW, SIMILAR TO THE COVID CRISIS THAT WE ARE EXPERIENCING RIGHT NOW OUR MOST SOCIALLY VULNERABLE POPULATIONS ARE VULNERABLE FROM THESE RESPIRATORY DISEASES SO WE THINK THERE IS INEQUITY BAKED INTO THOSE DECISIONS AND WE ARE OPPOSED TO IT. SO WE ARE VERY EXCITED ABOUT SOME OF THE INITIAL IT WAS THAT ARE TAKING PLACE IN THE CITY, ONE I AM SURE WE WILL TALK ABOUT IN THIS HEARING BUT UNLESS THE PARKS HEARING, THE URBAN FORESTRY MASTER PLAN IS ONE OF THE ACTIONS WE CAN TAKE TO EXPAND TREE CANOPY IN THESE NEIGHBORHOODS THAT ARE MOST AFFECTED TO TRY TO CUT DOWN ON SOME OF THE PARTICULATE MATTER FROM POLLUTION. WITH THAT I WILL DEFER TO CARLTON REST OF THE ANSWER. >> THANK YOU, COUNCILOR, FOR YOUR ATTENTION TO THESE ISSUES. THEY ARE VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE IN THE ENVIRONMENT DEPARTMENT HAVE BEEN PAYING ATTENTION TO THAT RESEARCH ABOUT HOW AIR POLLUTION LEVELS VARY ACROSS THE CITY FOR MANY YEARS I HAVE KNOWN THE SCIENTISTS WHO WORK ON THE UNION OF CONCERNED SCIENTISTS REPORT THAT YOU MENTIONED AND HAVE BEEN TALKING WITH THEM FOR A DOZEN YEARS OR MORE AND IT IS

VERY IMPORTANT. MOST -- AS I -- AS I KNOW YOU ARE AWARE MOST OF THAT POLLUTION ARISES FROM VEHICULAR TRAFFIC. AND THE -- SO IT IS OUR WAY OF ADDRESSING THAT DIRECTLY IS THROUGH THE TYPE OF PLANNING THAT IS BEING LED BY THE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT AND AS REFLECTED IN THE GO BOSTON 2030 TRANSPORTATION PLAN THAT CAME OUT A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO. THAT PLAN IS ABSOLUTELY CON GRIEWT WITH, CONGRESS GRIEWT WITH OUR ACTION CON GRIEWBT BECAUSE IT CONGRUENT TO, SO ADDRESSING CONGESTION, ADDRESSING AIR POLLUTION AND ADDRESSING CARBON EMISSIONS FROM TRANSPORTATION IT IS ALL THE SAME SET OF ISSUES AND AGAIN, MOST OF THE WORK IS BEING LED BY **OUR COLLEAGUES IN THE** TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT. WE HAVE AN SMALL PART TO PLAY THROUGH THE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL COMMISSION WHICH ADMINISTERS PARKING FREEZES IN DOWNTOWN SOUTH BOSTON AND A LIMITED ONE IN EAST BOSTON AND THE IDEA IS THERE IS THAT BY CONTROLLING THE NUMBER OF PARKING SPACES AVAILABLE WE HAVE SOME CONTROL OVER THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE DRIVING INTO BOSTON. WE ARE IN THE PROCESS OF AMENDING THE REGULATIONS OF THE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL COMMISSION FOR THE PARKING FEES RIGHT NOW TO MAKE THEM A MORE CONSISTENT WITH EACH OTHER AND WE ARE LOOKING AT THE COMMISSION HAS ASKED US TO BE THE POSSIBILITY OF ESTABLISHING A UNIFORM FEE FOR THOSE SPACES. AND THE PERMITS UNDER THE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL COMMISSION FOR THE FREEZE ALSO INCLUDE A VARIETY OF TRAFFIC DEMAND MANAGEMENT AND OTHER ISSUES TO

TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT AND IN THE BPDA TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE A CONSISTENT SET OF MEASURES, CONSISTENT SET OF GUIDELINES TO INCREASE THE SHIFT TO PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. NONPOLLUTING SOURCES OF TRANSPORTATION AND THEN TO -- AND ALSO TO ENCOURAGE THE SWITCH TO ELECTRIC VEHICLES ALSO, TO REDUCE AIR POLLUTION FROM VEHICLES IN THAT WAY. >> OKAY. THANK YOU. I KNOW MY -- MY TIME IS UP. I WANT TO SAY THANK YOU TO THE TEAM FOR YOUR GREAT WORK AND LOOKING FORWARD TO CONTINUING TO WORK WITH YOU, ESPECIALLY ON AIR POLLUTION AND NOISE POLLUTION RELATED ISSUES AND CLIMATE RESILIENCY AS WELL SO AGAIN, THANK YOU FOR YOUR PROFESSIONALISM AND HARD WORK. >> THANK YOU. >> GREAT, THANK YOU SO MUCH, COUNCILOR FLYNN. COUNCILOR BAKER. >> THANK YOU, CHAIRMAN BOK. >> GOOD MORNING, EVERYONE, KARL, HI, HOW ARE YOU? CYST. CHRIS, HOW ARE YOU? JUST THREE POINTS THAT EITHER KARL OR CHRIS YOU TALK ABOUT AND YOU TOUCHED ON IT A LITTLE BIT, CHRIS, IN THE PLANNING AROUND MOAKLEY PARK, CAN YOU GO A LITTLE FURTHER INTO THAT AND TELL US HOW THE PLANNING -- HOW WE ARE COORDINATING WITH THE STATE ON THAT WHOLE STRETCH. I MEAN TO ME IT STARTS AT MOAKLEY PARK AND GOES ALL THE WAY TO -- CAN YOU JUST TALK A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THAT PLANNING? THAT'S ONE THING. THE SECOND THING IS, WHERE ARE YOU GUYS ON -- AND I TALKED TO CHRIS OSGOOD QUITE OFTEN ABOUT IT, THE WAY THE FUTURE IS WITH RECYCLING AND COMPOSTING, YOU GUYS HAVE AN OFFICIAL POSITION

OR JUST THOUGHTS ON WHAT WE

SHOULD BE DOING THERE?

I THINK WE SHOULD BE BUILDING OUR OWN INFRASTRUCTURE, WHETHER IT IS FOR RECYCLING AND/OR COMPOSTING. BUILDING OUR OWN INFRASTRUCTURE WOULD ALLOW US TO KIND OF HAVE SOME INPUT ON WHAT WE ARE PAYING, NOT JUST ONCE WE HAVE THAT INFRASTRUCTURE IN PLACE. BUT THERE WOULD BE SURETY IN TEN YEARS ONCE WE OWN THE INFRASTRUCTURE. AND THEN MY THIRD POINT WAS

TREES, CHRIS.

>> YOU AND I LOVE TO TALK TREES WITH YOU.

I KNOW THE PARKS DEPARTMENT HAS ABOUT A MILLION DOLLARS THAT THEY CAN -- IS THAT ALL WE PLAN ON WITH THE CITY?

DOES YOUR DEPARTMENT PLAN ON INVESTING AT ALL IN TREE CANOPY AND ANYTHING LIKE THAT? LIKE WHAT IS THE PLAN WITH THAT MILLION?

IS THAT CANOPY, IS THAT NEW TREES?

IS THAT, YOU KNOW, SOME OF THE OLD GROWTH TREES, WE HELP THOSE OUT?

AND OF COURSE I AM TALKING --PARK AND DORCHESTER PARK. SO THOSE THREE POINTS IF WE COULD JUST TALK ABOUT THOSE AND THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

>> GREAT.

KARL, IF IT IS ALL RIGHT WITH YOU I THINK I WILL TALK ABOUT TREES VERY BRIEFLY AND THEN PERHAPS YOU AND AL -- CAN TALK ABOUT ZERO WASTE AND THEN THE COORDINATION WITH THE STATE AROUND MOAKLEY AND CLIMATE READY DORCHESTER.

DOES THAT MAKE SENSE?

>> **GREAT**.

SO JUST VERY BRIEFLY ON THE TREES, COUNCILOR BAKER, WE COULDN'T BE MORE EXCITED ABOUT IT, AGAIN WE WILL TALK MORE ABOUT THIS IN THE PARKS DIDN'T UPCOMING BUDGET HEARING BUT JUST TO BE CLEAR THAT IS AN ADDITIONAL MILLION DOLLARS FOR

PLANTING AND IN ADDITION TO THE

NORMAL LINE ITEMS WE TYPICALLY HAVE, WHICH IS AROUND \$900,000 IN THE PARKS DEPARTMENT. IT IS ALSO, THOUGH, FOR CARE, AND I THINK THAT IS REALLY CRITICAL TO YOUR POINT, COUNCIL RECORD, AND THE IS SOMETHING YOU AND I HAVE TALKED ABOUT AT LENGTH BEFORE AND IN FACT YOU HAVE POINTED OUT TO ME WHEN I WAS AN EARLY PARK COMMISSION SEARCH THERE IS A LOT MORE VALUE IN THESE OLDER TREES THAN WE THOUGHT. AND ALL OF THE RECENT STUDIES IN THE PAST FIVE YEARS HAVE JUST REINFORCED THAT VIEWPOINT. IT IS REALLY NOT ABOUT NUMBER OF TREES PLANTED. IT IS ABOUT TREE CANOPY. AND SO IF IT IS ABOUT TREE CANOPY, INHERENTLY LARGER TREES ARE THAT MUCH MORE VALUABLE. SO WHAT WE ARE REALLY EXCITED ABOUT IN THE PARKS DEPARTMENT'S BUDGET IS THE \$500,000 THAT IS ASSOCIATED WITH THE URBAN FORESTRY MASTER PLAN, AND WHAT THAT WILL DO IS NOT ONLY DEVELOP A MASTER PLAN THAT HAS EQUITY **BUILT IN AS AN INTENTIONAL** MOTIVATOR FOR WHERE WE ARE GOING TO CONTINUE PLANTING IN THE CITY, TO MAKE SURE THERE ARE NOT THESE SOCIAL INEQUITIES AROUND AIR POLLUTION THAT COUNCILOR FLYNN REFERENCED BUT ALSO WE WOULD HAVE THE ABILITY TO DEVELOP NEW RULES, NEW REGULATIONS, YOU KNOW, A NEW ORDINANCE TO PROTECT SOME OF THOSE OLD GROWTH TREES THAT YOU ARE TALKING ABOUT BECAUSE THEY ARE SO VALUABLE NOT ONLY FROM A STORM WATER MANAGEMENT PER PERSPECTIVE, FROM THE -- ISLAND PERSPECTIVE, FROM AN AIR POLLUTION PERSPECTIVE. BUT REALLY JUST A VERY BASIC CARBON SEQUESTRATION, YOU KNOW, THEY ARE SUCKING IN A LOT MORE CARBON THAN SOME OF THESE NEWER TREES SO THEY DO NEED TO BE PROTECTED BUT THAT IS WHAT WE ARE MOST

KARL, WHICHEVER SUBJECT YOU WANT TO TAKE FIRST ON -->> THANK YOU. CHRIS. JUST WOULD ADD TO WHAT THE CHIEF SAID, AS I MENTIONED BEFORE, WE WORK CLOSELY WITH THE PARKS DEPARTMENT. WE ARE INVOLVED IN THE MASTER PLANNING EFFORT TO, AGAIN, COORDINATE IT WITH ALL OF THE OTHER ASPECTS OF OUR APPROACH TO CLIMATE, CARBON REDUCTION -- IN REGARD TO -- COMPOSTING COUNCILOR, I THINK AS YOU KNOW. THE MAYOR RELEASED A ZERO WASTE PLAN OVER A YEAR AGO AND THAT WAS A VERY -- THAT WAS A JOINT EFFORT OF THE OUR CABINET AND THE STREETS CABINET, CHRIS OSGOOD COCHAIRED THE --COMMITTEE AND THE GROUP WE **BROUGHT TOGETHER TO -- AND** OBVIOUSLY COMPOSTING ARE VERY IMPORTANT COMPONENTS OF THAT. I BELIEVE YOU HEARD FROM CHIEF OSGOOD A FEW DAYS AGO THAT, YOU KNOW, THAT THE NEW MEASURES --THE NEW PROGRAMS WE ENCOURAGE AND INCREASE COMPOSTING AND TO INCREASE RECYCLING OF TEXTILES, WHERE THE CITY TOOK -- LATER THIS YEAR, THOSE EFFORTS ARE BEING LED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS. BUT OUR TEAMWORKS VERY CLOSELY WITH THEM IN PUTTING THOSE OUT. ALSO THE IDEA OF OWNING OUR OWN INFRASTRUCTURE WAS ONE OF THE STRATEGIES THAT ARE DISCUSSED IN THE ZERO WASTE PLAN, NOT WITH A **DEFINITIVE INCLUSION BUT IT WAS** THAT IT WAS SOMETHING THAT THE CITY DEFINITELY SHOULD BE LOOKING INTO AND THAT ALSO IT IS GOING TO BE LED, AN ANALYSIS OF THAT IDEA IS GOING TO BE LED BY THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT. ALSO AND I BELIEVE THERE HAS BEEN SOME ALLOCATED SPECIFICALLY IN THE BUDGET SO THEY CAN START TO EXPLORE THAT IDEA. I WOULD LIKE TO ASK ALAN OUR DIRECTOR OF THE ENVIRONMENTAL

EXCITED ABOUT.

PLANNING AND HAS DIRECT RESPONSIBILITY TO TALK ABOUT THE -- ARE THERE ANY EXAMPLES, ARE THERE ANY MUNICIPALITIES OR EVEN STATES, FOR THAT MATTER, THAT HAVE THEIR OWN COME POST, COM POST OPERATIONS LIKE LARGE SCALE THAT COULD HANDLE OUR POPULATION?

ARE THERE ANY EXAMPLES OF IT AROUND THE COUNTRY, AROUND THE WORLD?

COUNCILOR, I AM SURE THERE ARE, BUT IF YOU DON'T MINDLY SUBMIT THAT INFORMATION TO YOU LATER BUT I WOULD MAKE SURE I IDENTIFY THEM ALL CORRECTLY.

KARL AND CHRIS. >> IF I COULD ADD VERY BRIEFLY THAT THE STATE HAS BEEN AN EXCELLENT PARTNER WITH US. SINCE WE STARTED OUR CLIMATE PLANNING. THEY GIVE US SOME LARGE GRANTS THAT HELPED FINANCE CLIMATE READY BOSTON REPORT, 2016, AND THIS IS JUST A CONTINUED COLLABORATION THAT WE HAVE. >> GREAT. >> THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. >> THANK YOU, COUNCILOR BAKER, NEXT UP IS COUNCILOR O'MALLEY, CHAIR OF OUR ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE AND THEN WE WILL HAVE COUNCILOR BREADON. >> THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR, CHRIS, KARL, ALLISON, THANK YOU FOR YOUR GREAT WORK, ESPECIALLY DURING THESE DIFFICULT TIMES. THERE IS A LOT TO GET THROUGH. I WILL START WITH ANSWERING COUNCILOR BAKER'S QUESTION. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF CITIES THAT HAVE. >> ALAMEDA, CALIFORNIA, DENVER, LA, I SHARE THIS AND LOOK FORWARD TO CONTINUING THE CONVERSATION. THE FIRST ROUND OF QUESTIONS, AND I APPRECIATE, I GOT MOST OF THE RESPONSES LAST NIGHT, THE QUESTIONS AT THE CLOSE OF THE WORKING SESSION BUT I WANT TO START ABOUT USING CITY FUNDS, OR HAVING THE CITY ACQUIRE LAND TO ADVANCE RESILIENCY IN OUR CLIMATE GOALS. AND I ASKED IF THERE ARE ANY SPECIFIC IN THE TIMELINE AND THE RESPONSES, WITH AN OPEN MIND, GREAT PLACE TO START IN REFERENCES THAT -- OPEN HOUSE IN DORCHESTER WHERE THERE WAS SOME DISCUSSION ABOUT DOING THIS. I WOULD JUST SORT OF ADD TO THAT THE OPPORTUNITY IN ROSLINDALE. IN THE WETLAND AREA WE KNOW PLACES WELL. I PLAYED THERE AS A KID AND SPENT A GREAT SANCTUARY FOR ME

TO WALK AND RUN THROUGH DURING

THIS PANDEMIC.

BUT THIS IS ANOTHER GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR US TO ADVANCE THAT GOAL.

-- THE FUNDING HEARING LAST WEEK
IF THAT COULD PERHAPS BE ANOTHER
REVENUE STREAM GOING FORWARD.
BUT SPECIFICALLY THE QUESTION
IS, WHAT WITH WOULD THE PROCESS
LOOK LIKE FOR THE CITY TO
ACQUIRE LAND TO ADVANCE OUR
RESILIENCY GOALS SIMILARLY THE
WAY THAT WE ACQUIRED LAND FOR
OUR HOUSING GOALS AND SOME OTHER
OPPORTUNITIES.

>> SO I AM NOT GOING TO ADDRESS THE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE, BECAUSE I AM NOT ACTUALLY SURE ON WHAT THAT IS, BUT I HAVE BEEN TRYING TO LOOK INTO IT. I THINK IT IS MORE IMPORTANT TO THINK ABOUT, HOW DO WE SELECT AND PRIORITIZE PARCELS THAT WE MIGHT WANT TO ACQUIRE. OUR DEPARTMENT IS GOING TO BE WORKING WITH THE PARKS DEPARTMENT AND I KNOW COMMISSIONER WOODS IS GOING TO BE APPEARING BEFORE YOU THIS AFTERNOON AND WILL TALK ABOUT IT MORE.

BUT THE PARKS DEPARTMENT IS GOING TO BE LEADING SORT OF A PARCEL PRIORITIZATION OR PURCHASE -- PURCHASING PRIORITIZATION EFFORT, SO THAT

THAT IS HOW WE WILL MOVE

FORWARD.

STRONG SUPPORT AND LEADERSHIP

YOU HAVE SHOWN IN THE COUNCIL IN

PASSING THIS AND MANY OTHER

ENVIRONMENTAL MEASURES.

IT HAS BEEN GREAT TO WORK WITH

YOU OVER THIS WHOLE TIME.

WE -- AS I MENTIONED THE THREE

STAFF POSITIONS THAT ARE INCLUDED IN THE MAYOR'S PROPOSED BUDGET, THEY ARE ALL GOING TO THE CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENT TEAM, SO ONE IS FOCUSED ON ZERO WASTE.

ONE IS FOCUSED ON THE WETLANDS,
AND CONSERVATION COMMISSION, AND

AND EVEN THOUGH IT IS NOT

WHOLE ENABLE US TO BE MORE
EFFECTIVE IN ALL OF THE REALMS

WE ARE WORKING UNDER ALLISON

YOU IDENTIFIED --

[INDISCERNIBLE] -- AND ANOTHER ACTION THAT STONING IS TOWARD. THIS ACCOUNTS FOR 85 PERCENT OF OUR 70 TO 80 PERCENT OF OUR MISSIONS SO THEY ARE ALSO A REALLY CRITICAL COMPONENT. SO HERE WE ARE LOOKING AT UPDATES TO THE VERDO ORDINANCE .. THAT COULD SUPPORT REASONABLE BUT AGGRESSIVE CARBON TARGETS THAT EXISTING LARGE BUILDINGS

WOULD NEED TO ACHIEVE, IT WAS RAMPED DOWN OVER TIME IN

CHARLES RIVER.

IT IS INCREASINGLY RECOGNIZED AS

A PROBLEM WITH HEAT -- IN THE

SUMMER AND I JUST WANTED TO FLAG

UP THE COASTAL AREAS ARE

EXTREMELY IMPORTANT TO ATTEND TO

WE ALSO NEED TO ADDRESS CLIMATE

READINESS INLAND.

THEN I AM DELIGHTED TO HEAR

THERE IS MORE MONEY GOING INTO

URBAN FORESTRY.

AGAIN IN ALLSTON WITH NEW

DEVELOPMENT. I WOULD LIKE TO SEE

YOU WORK WITH THE BPDA TO SEE

WHEN A FORMER INDUSTRIAL AREA IS

CONVERTED TO RESIDENTIAL I WOULD

LIKE TO SEE A MORE ROBUST

DEVELOPMENT OF NEW GREEN SPACE

AROUND NEW DEVELOPMENT, WE ARE

ADDING A LOT OF DENSITY BUT NOT

ADDING A LOT OF GREEN SPACE IN

THE NEIGHBORHOODS WHICH PROBABLY

SPACE IN THE WHOLE CITY.

>> AND LET'S SEE.

OH, YES.

ALONG THE PIKE, ON LINCOLN

STREET, THOSE AREAS WERE

FORMERLY INDUSTRIAL AND

INCREASINGLY BECOMING

RESIDENTIAL AND THERE IS A LOT

OF PROBLEMS WITH NOISE POLLUTION

AND AIR POLLUTION.

INCREASED LEVELS OF ASTHMA ALONG

THAT CORRIDOR.

I WOULD LIKE TO SEE SOME

INITIATIVES AROUND TRYING TO

BUILD SUN BARRIERS THAT WOULD

ALSO DECREASE THE LEVEL OF

PARTICULATE MATTER THAT IS

LEAKING INTO THE NEW RESIDENTIAL

NEIGHBORHOODS ALONG THE PIKE THERE.

SO THOSE ARE TISSUES I HAVE FOR

RIGHT NOW.

I ALSO -- THERE IS ONE MORE.

THE PROTECTION OF URBAN WILDS.

WE SOMEWHERE LOST SEVERAL IN

ALLSTON, BRIGHTON IN THE LAST

DECADE OR SO.

I AM ENCOURAGED TO HEAR YOU ARE

LOOKING AT POSSIBLY ACQUISITION

OF PARCELS OF LAND THAT WE COULD

BUILD SOME MORE CLIMATE

RESILIENCY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD.

BUT, YOU KNOW, I THINK THAT IS

AGAIN TRYING TO KEEP OUR TREE

CANOPY AND CREATE NEW GREEN

SPACE IS REALLY IMPORTANT.

NOT JUST FOR SPORTS AND

RECREATION BUT ALSO PASSIVE

GREEN SPACE. THANK YOU.

>> THANK YOU, COUNCILOR. I THINK I CAN ADDRESS MOST OF THOSE WITH THE EXCEPTION AND I WILL HAVE TO FOLLOW UP WITH YOU ON THE SPECIFICS OF THE LINCOLN STREET AREA, IF THAT'S OKAY, COUNCILOR.

>> SO MOVING FORWARD, I WILL HAVE KARL SPEAK TO THE NEXT PHASE OF CLIMATE READY WORK, WHICH DOES HAVE TO FOCUS MORE ON SOME OF THE POTENTIALS OF THE INLAND FLOODING FROM THE RIVERS AND THE -- AND THE CHARLES BUT WE HAVE ALREADY DONE A FAIRLY ROBUST ANALYSIS OF THAT, IF NOT THE DISTRICT ANALYSIS THAT WE HAVE DONE ON THE SEA LEVEL RISE. BUT WHAT I DO WANT TO SAY ABOUT LOWER ALLSTON IS THAT THERE IS A BIG OPPORTUNITY THERE, YOU KNOW, IT IS CALLED LOWER ALLSTON FOR A REASON.

THERE IS A LOT OF WAYS FOR THE WATER TO DRAIN.

THERE IS A CURRENT PROJECT PROPOSED BY BOSTON WATER AND SEWER THAT THEY ARE ACTUALLY TRYING TO PARTNER WITH HARVARD UNIVERSITY TO IMPLEMENT THE --THEY CALL THE IT MASDEP PROVIDE WHICH WOULD PROVIDE A NEW SEWER LINE THAT WOULD PREVENT NEIGHBORS FROM, YOU KNOW, ALMOST 1.300 HOMES FROM THE POTENTIAL OF FLOODING.

I WILL SAY YOUR ASSESSMENT OF ALLSTON IS CORRECT AS FAR AS CANOPY AND AS FAR AS AVAILABLE GREEN SPACE.

IT IS NOT THE LOWEST IN THE CITY, BUT IT DOES HAVE POCKETS WHERE IT IS VERY, VERY UNDER TREE CANOPY.

THEN IN ADDITION EVEN THOUGH 100 PERCENT OF OUR RESIDENTS IN THE CITY OF BOSTON LIVE WITHIN A TEN-MINUTE WALK OF THE PARK THERE ARE STILL WITHIN THAT FRAMEWORK POCKETS OF INEQUITY BUILT IN AND ONE OF THOSE POCKETS IS IN THE ALLSTON, SO

AGAIN AS THOSE INSTITUTIONAL MATS SEARCH PLANS DEVELOPMENT, AS THE BPDA WITH DEVELOPS .. WITH THE NEIGHBORHOOD IN ALLSTON, A PRIORITY OF OURS WILL BE EXPANSION OF GREEN SPACE IN ALLSTON AND IN ADDITION AND PERHAPS MORE IMPORTANTLY THE CREATION OF CONTINUOUS GREEN SPACE SO THAT PEOPLE HAVE SAFE GREEN WAYS TO GET IN AND OUT OF THE NEIGHBORHOOD. KARL. IS THERE ANYTHING YOU WANT TO ADD ON THE CLIMATE READY ASPECT? >> YES. SO COUNCILOR, THANK YOU FOR YOUR QUESTION. CERTAINLY WE ARE LOOKING CLOSELY AT ALLSTON AND, YOU KNOW, NOT **EQUITY** NEGLECTING ANY OF OUR NEIGHBORHOODS IN THE CLIMATE READY PLANNING WORK. IN REGARD TO FLOODING FROM THE CHARLES RIVER, WE CERTAINLY RECOGNIZE THAT WITH ENOUGH SEA LEVEL RISE IT IS POSSIBLE THAT THE CHARLES RIVER DAM, THE WATER GOES OVER THE CHARLES RIVER DAM OR THE CHARLES RIVER DAM GETS BYPASSED BUT IT IS FRANKLY IT IS FARTHER DOWN IN TERMS OF TIME AND IT IS MUCH LESS OF A PRIORITY IN TERMS OF OUR IMMEDIATE PLANNING. WHAT WE HAVE BEEN DOING IS WE HAVE BEEN ENGAGING WITH THE STATE TO THINK ABOUT TWO ASPECT OFFICE THE CHARLES RIVER DAM. ONE, WHAT DO WE DO IN THE LONG-TERM WITH THE CHARLES RIVER DAM SO THAT WATER IT DOESN'T GET OVER THE TOP IN COASTAL STORMS WITH A SEA LEVEL RISE. AND THE SECOND THING IS. IS THERE ENOUGH CAPACITY TO COME OUT OF THE CHARLES RIVER BASIN. SO THAT WHEN THERE IS VARYING INLAND OF PRECIPITATION, THAT IT CAN KEEP THE WATER FROM RISING UP BEHIND THE DAM. IT IS A STATE RESPONSIBILITY,

BUT WE ARE WORKING VERY CLOSELY

WITH THEM ABOUT HOW WE DO THAT. AND, YOU KNOW, IT WOULD -- BUT IT IS A LITTLE FARTHER DOWN THE LINE THAN SOME OF THE OTHER THINGS WE ARE LOOKING AT AND I THINK CHIEF COOK ADDRESSED OUR CONCERNS ABOUT HEATH AND ALLSTON TOO AND THE CANOPY.

>> THANK YOU.

JUST THE WHOLE MANAGEMENT OF -WATER, THE NEW DRAINAGE PIPE
THAT THE BOSTON WATER AND SEWER
IS WORKING ON IS A SEVEN-FOOT -TO THE RIVER. YOU KNOW, IT IS
GREAT THAT IT WILL PROVIDE
DRAINAGE IN THAT AREA BUT I AM
JUST CONCERNED THAT IT IS GOING
TO BUTT A LOT OF EXTRA PRESSURE.
AND WE NEED TO DO SOME SMALL
STUFF LIKE -- COUNCILOR BRAEDON,
WE JUST LOST YOU.

>> WE HAVE BEEN MANAGING OUR RUNOFF WITH BIOSWALES AND WIND GARDENS IS ANOTHER IMPORTANT ASPECT WE SHOULD BE ATTENDING TO AS WELL.

THANK YOU.

>> COUNCILOR, YOU ARE RIGHT, AND ACTUALLY IF ANYTHING COVID, THE COVID CRISIS IS ACTUALLY ACCELERATED CHIEF OSGOOD AND IT'S COORDINATION ABOUT ENHANCING THE PUBLIC REALLY ONLY WITH GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE. IT HAS TO BE A PRIORITY .. SO WE WILL CONTINUE THAT PLANNING AND WE WILL LOOK AT THE NEIGHBORHOODS MOST AFFECTED AND CERTAINLY I MEAN LOWER ALLSTON AS FAR AS STORM WATER IS GREATLY AFFECTED.

ONE OF THE AREAS OPEN FOR A LOT OF FOLKS TO GET INVOLVED AND FOR THE CITY TO FARM THIS OUT IS CHANGES OR PAINTING THE ROOFS OF OUR MUNICIPAL BUILDINGS WHITE. I BELIEVE THAT THAT HELPS WITH THE HEAT RESISTANCE AND MAKING THEMED -- I DON'T KNOW --

BETTER.

SO I'M WONDERING IS WHY CAN'T WE HAVE A PROGRAM THAT LOOK AT OUR SENIOR STATES PROGRAM THAT CONTRACTS \$10,000 OR LESS BUT GET OUT THERE AND RETRO-FIT. SO MY LAST QUESTION IS ABOUT

UTILITY BILLS.

SO IMMEDIATE TERM, FOR DEVELOPMENT OF REGULATIONS THAT WOULD NEED TO BE PUT IN PLACE SO THAT WE CAN IMPLEMENT THE PROVISIONS OF THE NEW ORDINANCE AND TO HELP WITH NEW APPLICATIONS TO THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION TO MAKE SURE THEY'RE ADHERING TO THE REQUIREMENTS AND TO HELP WITH WHAT YOU DESCRIBED. WE SELECTED THE BUILDINGS FOR A THIRD PHASE, WHICH INCLUDE SIX POOLS FOR WHAT WE'RE CALLING DEEP DIVES, WHICH ARE FAIRLY

COMPREHENSIVE REVIEWS.

WE'VE SELECTED ANOTHER

APPROXIMATELY TEN SCHOOLS TO DO

LIGHTER TOUCHES, WHICH WILL

INCLUDE LIGHTING, WATER

CONVERSATION, BUILDING, PROBABLY

NOT QUITE AS DEEP A DIVE ON THE

INFRASTRUCTURE.

IN ADDITION TO THAT, WE'RE

LOOKING AT 30 BUILDINGS, ABOUT

25 SCHOOLS FOR SOLAR PANELS ON

THE ROOFS OR ON PARKING LOT

CANOPIES.

THESE ARE ROOFS THAT WERE

IDENTIFIED AS NEWER ROOFS

BECAUSE YOU DON'T WANT TO PUT

SOLAR PANELS ON ROOFS THAT ARE

DUE TO BE REPLACED.

SO WE ARE TARGETING THIS.

WE'RE HOPING TO START THE

AUDITING WORK ON THAT OVER THE

NEXT MONTHS OR TWO.

AND WE WOULD BE EXPECTING TO

START A FULL DESIGN WORK EARLY

NEXT YEAR IN THE CONSTRUCTION

WORK WOULD PROBABLY START IN THE

LAST QUARTER OF THIS FISCAL YEAR

OR THE FIRST QUARTER OF THE

FOLLOWING YEAR.

WE'RE TRYING TO CATCH THAT SUMMER CONSTRUCTION. THERE'S A FAIR AMOUNT OF PLANNING THAT HAS TO GO IN. WHICH MAKES IT HARD TO SORT OF MOBILIZE TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE FACT THAT PEOPLE AREN'T IN BUILDINGS NOW.

BUT WE ARE DEFINITELY MOVING THE SCHOOLS.

ON THE UTILITY -- I'M SENSITIVE TO THE TIME.

I HAVE A SHORT ANSWER ON UTILITY BILLS.

AS YOU KNOW, WE ARE IN THE PROCESS OF TRYING TO GET OUR MUNICIPAL AGGREGATION PROGRAM UP AND RUNNING.

ONE OF THE PRINCIPLES THAT WE ESTABLISHED IS TRY TO PROVIDE UTILITY BILL STABILITY AND REFLECT WHAT WE KNOW, THAT A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER OF BOSTON RESIDENTS ARE ENERGY BURDENED AND WE'RE TRYING TO COME UP WITH STRATEGIES FOR PROVIDING A LOWER COST OF ELECTRICITY. MAY NOT SOLVE THE PROBLEM THAT

IS ARISING RIGHT NOW BUT WE'RE TRYING TO ADDRESS IT FOR THE LONGER TERM.

COUNCILLOR WU AND THEN COUNCILLOR CAMPBELL AND THEN COUNCILLOR ESSAIBI-GEORGE. COUNCILLOR WU.

>> THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. GOOD MORNING, EVERYONE. I HAD A QUESTION ON THE MUNICIPAL CARBON FOOTPRINT.

WHAT IS THE UPDATE?

WE TALKED ABOUT RENEW BOSTON TRUST, ET CETERA.

ALSO WONDERING ABOUT THE ENERGY PROCUREMENT FOR BUILDINGS AND ANY DECISION ON MOVING TO ENERGY CREDITS OR SOLAR PANELS OR JUST LOOKING AT CITY BUILDINGS IN PARTICULAR.

ALSO ON THE MASTER PLAN, WHICH I KNOW IS GOING TO BE LATER TODAY, BUT JUST HOPING I COULD GET

QUICK ANSWERS ON WHETHER THAT IS FOCUSED ON CITY-OWNED TREES OR HOW NONCITY-OWNED -- TREES ON PRIVATE PROPERTY FITS INTO THAT AND WHAT THE PROCESS IS LIKE OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT. >> THANK YOU, COUNCILLOR. I CAN BRIEFLY TOUCH ON THE MASTER PLAN B THAT IS PROBABLY BEST SUITED TO TALK ABOUT THE CITY'S UTILITY USE. VERY QUICKLY, THE POINT -- THE REASON IT'S SUCH ROBUST BUDGET FOR THE URBAN FORESTRY MASTER PLAN. WE'LL HAVE ROBUST PUBLIC PROCESS AND HOPEFULLY WE CAN HAVE THE SAME KIND OF PUBLIC PROCESS THAT WE'RE ALL ACCUSTOMED TO HAVING THE PARKS DEPARTMENT ABOUT CAPITAL WORK, NEIGHBORHOOD GROUP MEETINGS, SURVEYS. WE HOPE NOT TO BE COMPLETELY LIMITED TO ZOOM MEETINGS AND OTHERS IN THE COVID CRISIS. BUT WE ALSO NEED TO ACCELERATE THE WORK. TO YOUR SECOND QUESTION, IT'S CRITICAL THAT THE URBAN FORESTER MASTER PLAN CONCENTRATES NOT ONLY ON TREES IN THE PUBLIC WAY OR IN THE PUBLIC DOMAIN. IT'S CRITICAL THAT IT FOCUSES ON TREES ON PRIVATELY-OWNED PROPERTY TO COUNCILLOR BAKER'S EARLIER QUESTIONS, IT'S OFTEN THOSE PROPERTIES THAT ACTUALLY HAVE THESE OLDER TREES WITH LARGE CANOPY. SO IT'S VERY, VERY IMPORTANT THAT WE CONCENTRATE ON THEM AND COME UP WITH A PRESERVATION STRATEGY FOR A CARBONw3 REPLACEMENT STRATEGY WHEN PEOPLE. >> LET ME START THE SECOND QUESTION. COUNCILLOR, THANK YOU. THE CITY'S MUNICIPAL OPERATIONS, CARBON EMISSIONS ARE DOWN OVER 40% SINCE 2025. WE'VE MADE SIGNIFICANT PROCESS.

CURRENTLY IN TERMS OF BUYING RENEWABLE ENERGY OR BUYING

RENEWABLE ELECTRICITY, WE BUY FOR ABOUT A THIRD, ROUGHLY A THIRD OF OUR ELECTRICITY PROCUREMENT.

IN ADDITION TO THE INCREASE IN P.B. INSTALLATION OR CITY BUILDINGS, WE HAVE A COUPLE MORE

COMING UP TO TALK ABOUT.

WE ARE HAVING A BIG FOCUS THROUGH THE RENEW BOSTON ON

REDUCING OUR ENERGY CONSUMPTION

OVERALL.

AT THE MOMENT, WE THINK THAT IS THE MOST EFFECTIVE AND MOST FAR-REACHING THING THAT WE CAN DO.

DAVID, DO YOU WANT TO TALK ABOUT THE INSTALLATIONS?

>> **SURE**.

WE COMPLETED TWO IN THE PAST

YEAR.

WE ARE WORKING ON ONE THAT WILL GO IN THIS SUMMER AT BOSTON POLICE HEADQUARTERS IN THE PARKING LOT.

AND WE'RE UNDER A POWER PURCHASE AGREEMENT.

THAT IS ADDING THE AMOUNT OF GREEN CAPACITY WITHIN THE CITY FOR PHASE 3 OF THE NEW BOSTON TRUST.

WE'RE LOOKING TO ADD UP TO 30
ADDITIONAL ROOFTOP OR PARKING
LOT STRUCTURES, WHICH IS A
PRETTY SUBSTANTIAL MOVE THAT
WOULD BE, YOU KNOW -- IF WE GOT
THEM ALL IN, IT WOULD BE ABOUT
10% OF CITY-OWNED BUILDINGS.
IN ADDITION, WE ARE WORKING ON
EFFICIENCY THROUGH THE EXISTING
RENEW BOSTON TRUST, WHICH WE'RE
RAMPING UP PHASES TWO AND THREE
AND ALSO GETTING READY TO LAUNCH
A RENEW BOSTON FOR EXTERIOR
LIGHTING.

WE WOULD ALLOW A CONVERSION OF EXTERIOR LIGHTING FROM -- WE STILL HAVE ABOUT 20% OF OUR STREET LIGHTS THAT ARE TRADITIONAL SODIUM VAPOR LAMPS TO MOVE THEM TO L.E.D., WHICH WOULD BE A SIGNIFICANT SAVINGS ON 20% ELECTRICITY USE FOR

EXTERIOR LIGHTING.
WE'RE GOING TO ASSESS THE REST
OF THEM TO TRY TO DETERMINE
WHETHER WE CAN USE CONTROLS TO
BETTER MANAGE HOW THE LIGHTS ARE
USED.
WE'VE SEEN CAMBRIDGE DO THIS.
WE'LL SEE 15 TO 20% REDUCTION IN
ENERGY USE.

I APPRECIATE THE DEPARTMENT'S INTENTIONALITY AROUND EQUITY. THAT IS ONE QUESTION ABOUT THE APPROACH NOW. OBVIOUSLY WITH THE IMPACT OF

OBVIOUSLY WITH THE IMPACT OF COVID-19 IN PARTICULARLY ON COMMUNITIES OF COUNCILLOR AND DORCHESTER, MATTAPAN, HOW DO WE THINK ABOUT ENVIRONMENTAL RESILIENCY IN SORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TOGETHER AND HOW DOES -- WHAT ARE THE SPECIFIC THINGS THE DEPARTMENT IS DOING.

JUST ON COVID, THE POPULATION THAT HAS BEEN MOST AFFECTED BY COVID ARE LIKELY TO BE THE SAME POPULATIONS THAT IF UNABATED ARE GOING TO BE MOST AFFECTED BY THE CLIMATE CRISIS.

SO THERE HAS TO BE AN INTENTIONALITY BEHIND THE DEPARTMENT'S WORK AND THE BOSTON HEALTH COMMISSION'S WORK AROUND THINGS LIKE AIR POLLUTION, SEA LEVEL RISE AND MORE.

I'LL SAY IN THAT HIERARCHY, THE REAL THREAT TODAY IS HEAT ISLAND EFFECT AND ALL THE PROBLEMS THAT

IT EXACERBATES AROUND

RESPIRATORY DISEASES.

LOOK AT ASTHMA RATES AMONG

SOCIALLY VULNERABLE POPULATIONS.

TREES ARE A PART OF THAT.

AS WE LOOK AT THE PANDEMIC

RESPONSE, WE DO ALSO HAVE TO

LOOK AT THE PUBLIC REALM AND SEE

HOW MUCH MORE ENHANCED THE PUBLIC REALM CAN WORK FOR US.

WE CAN NO LONGER LOOK AT PARKS

AS SOMEONE THAT IS SO UNDERSTANDING THE WORLD OF CLIMATE JUSTICE AND SOMEONE WHO HAS SURVIVED A LOT OF THE EFFECTS OF IT, YOU KNOW, I HAVE ASTHMA, MY DAUGHTER HAS ASTHMA. I GREW UP IN DORCHESTER AT A TIME -- YOU PROBABLY WEREN'T BORN THEN BUT HURRICANE DAVID, GEORGE, I DON'T REMEMBER, BUT I REMEMBER THAT WE WERE ABLE TO SWIM ON OUR STREET BECAUSE IT GOT SO FLOODED. SO I THINK ABOUT THAT. THAT HAPPENED SO LONG AGO. YOU KNOW, THE HOUSE THAT I BOUGHT IS IN DORCHESTER. THE STREET THAT I LIVE ON, IT'S A SIDE STREET AND IT GETS FLOODED, TOO. A LOT OF THE ENERGY WE FOCUS ARE ON THE BIGGER STREETS, FRANKLIN PARK AREA, THEY GET FLOODED BUT THE SIDE STREETS DO, TOO. I'M CURIOUS ABOUT WHAT KIND OF INFRASTRUCTURE OR IF THERE'S A DASHBOARD OR SOMEPLACE THAT WE CAN LOOK AT TO SEE THE SIDE STREETS THAT ARE TRENDING IN TERMS OF FLOODING AND WHAT TYPE OF COMMUNICATION AND OUTREACH IS BEING DONE TO THOSE NEIGHBORHOODS ABOUT HOW TO PROTECT THEMSELVES. HOW TO DEAL WITH THE FLOODING. I'M CURIOUS ABOUT THAT. I KNOW AND I APPRECIATE ALL OF THE QUESTIONS THAT YOU'VE GOTTEN FROM MY COLLEAGUES IN REGARD TO JUST COMMUNICATIONS TO LOW INCOME COMMUNITIES, SPECIFICALLY THOSE THAT DON'T RECOGNIZE THE CONNECTION BETWEEN THE

DISPARITIES THAT THEY HAVE FACED IN TERMS OF HEALTH AND HOW IT RELATES TO TRANSPORTATION AND EQUITY, HOW ALL OF THESE THINGS

JUST VERY QUICKLY ON TREES.

LITTLE KNOWN FACT THAT YOU CAN

CUT THE TREE BRANCHES TO YOUR OWN PROPERTY LINE.

SO IF THERE'S A BRANCH OR IF

THERE'S A LIMB THAT SPREAD OUT TO THE PUBLIC WAY, THE PARKS DEPARTMENT CAN ADDRESS THOSE LIMBS AS CAN PRIVATE PROPERTY OWNERS WHEN IT COMES ON THE PROPERTY. A LOT OF PEOPLE ASSUME THAT BECAUSE THE TREE ORIGINATES ON SOMEBODY ELSE'S PROPERTY, THEY CAN'T TAKE MEASURES TO ADDRESS DANGEROUS LIMBS. THE SECOND PART OF THE QUESTION, WE HAVE TO REMEMBER THE TREES ARE LIVING THINGS. JUST LIKE THE PEOPLE IN OUR HOUSE THAT WE HAVE CONFLICTS WITH, WE HAVE CONFLICTS WITHLYING THINGS. WE LIVE IN CONFLICT WITH TREES. JUST LIKE THE PEOPLE IN OUR HOUSE, THERE'S MORE BENEFITS TO LIVING WITH THOSE TREES THAN DISADVANTAGES. CERTAINLY IN MY EXPERIENCE, THERE'S A LOT OF BENEFITS TO TREES. WE DO HAVE TO PROACTIVELY PROTECT TREES. I WILL SAY THAT PART OF THE PROBLEMS THAT WE SEE WITH BRANCHES FALLING DOWN, CREATING DANGEROUS CONDITIONS IS THE LACK OF CARE THAT WE GIVE TO TREES. WITH PROPER PRUNING, TREES CAN BE VERY HEALTHY AND THEY CAN ACTUALLY LEAD TO AN ENVIRONMENT WHERE THERE'S LESS OF THOSE CONCERNS AND LESS CONFLICT. THEN IN THE PUBLIC REALM, WE NEED TO GIVE THE SPACE THAT TREES ARE DUE. WE HAVE TO WORK WITH THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT SO HOW DO WE MAKE ROOM FOR THE TREES SO THE ROOT SYSTEMS DON'T UPROOT SIDEWALKS AND PAVEMENTS AND CREATE ADA ISSUES. CARL? >> THANK YOU, CHIEF. SO COUNCILLOR, YOU'VE REFERRED A FEW TIMES TO THE CLIMATE LEADERS PROGRAM. THE REASON WE ESTABLISHED THESE

PROGRAMS IS TO ADDRESS THE

CULTURAL COMPETENCE THAT YOU'VE

DISCUSSED.

WE ARE GETTING LEADERS AND AMBASSADORS FROM THOSE COMMUNITIES AND TALKING WITH THEM.

THEY HAVE STEPPED FORWARD AS VOLUNTEERS TO TAKE BACK ALL OF **OUR VARIOUS MESSAGES AROUND** CLIMATE TO THEIR OWN COMMUNITY. TO THEIR OWN NETWORKS AND PUT IT IN A LANGUAGE AND A FRAME WORK THAT THEY FEEL THAT THEY THINK IS MOST EFFECTIVE FOR THEIR NETWORKS IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. IT'S BEEN A VERY SUCCESSFUL

IT'S NOT JUST ENGLISH BUT A COUPLE LANGUAGES.

I'M NOT SURE WE GOT TO SIKH BUT WE'RE WORKING ON IT'S.

PROGRAM.

-- TO HELP US EFFECTIVELY, YOU KNOW, WITH THOSE COMMUNITIES. THEY CAN BE INVOLVED AND TAKE ACTION.

WE HAVE LOTS OF TOOLS ON OUR WEBSITE AND WHICH WE TOUTED THOSE AS AMBASSADORS THAT ENABLE PEOPLE IN THEIR OWN RISKS. MORE DETAIL.

WE HAVE MAPPED WHERE WE EXPECT FLOODING TO OCCUR IN THE NEXT 50 YEARS.

FROM COASTAL STORMS AND INCREASED PRECIPITATION AND WHERE WE EXPECT HEAT TO INCREASE.

ALL OF THAT INFORMATION IS ON THE WEBSITE.

WE WORKED WITH SCIENCE LAST SUMMER.

A BUNCH OF CITIZEN SCIENTISTS WHERE THEY MAPPED WHERE -- YOU KNOW, ON THE ORDER OF 100 PEOPLE IN DISTRICT NEIGHBORHOODS AROUND BOSTON AND BOSTON AREA, GOING AROUND WITH, YOU KNOW, BASICALLY THERMOMETERS AND MORE SOPHISTICATED IN TERMS OF

EQUIPMENT AND ACTUALLY MAP WHERE

HEAT WAS HAPPENING.

SO THERE'S LOTS OF THAT

INFORMATION AVAILABLE AND. YOU KNOW, WE ARE EAGER TO GET IT OUT IN A WAY THAT IS MOST USEFUL TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE COMMUNITY. THE FINAL THING IS THAT WE ARE -- WE WORK VERY HARD TO ENGAGE ALL LEVELS OF THE COMMUNITY, OF THE BOSTON COMMUNITY IN A BROAD SENSE. WE WORK VERY CLOSELY WITH A GROUP CALLED THE GREEN RIBBON COMMISSION, WHICH CAME TOGETHER TEN YEARS AGO AFTER THE FIRST CLIMATE ACTION PLAN TO SUPPORT THE CITY'S IMPLEMENTATION OF ITS

AND NOW INCLUDES 35 LEADERS FROM MAJOR BOSTON BUSINESSES, INSTITUTIONS, UNIVERSITIES AND HOSPITALS, YOU KNOW, WHO ARE MAKING THEIR OWN COMMITMENTS TO ACTION IN THEIR OWN INSTITUTIONS AND HELP US INCREASE THE NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO ARE INVOLVED IN CLIMATE ACTION.

THE LATEST ADDITION LAST YEAR THE GREEN RIBBON COMMISSION WORKED WITH OUR ARTS OFFICE AND WITH THE ENVIRONMENT DEPARTMENT, A CULTURE WORKING GROUP, WHICH **INCLUDES LARGE AND SMALL** INSTITUTIONS OF ART, OF MUSIC, OF ENTERTAINMENT AND SPORTS AROUND BOSTON TO WORK TOGETHER. A RETROFIT OF EXISTING STOCK

EXISTING BUILDINGS ARE THE LION'S SHARE OF OUR MISSION BUT THERE'S A LARGE DIVERSITY TO UNDERSTAND HOW TO APPROACH RENT FIT AND DIFFERENT STRATEGIES FOR THESE BUILDINGS. WE MENTIONED A FEW TIMES EARLIER THE [INDISCERNIBLE] FOR THE LARGE EXISTING BUILDINGS. SO THAT [INDISCERNIBLE] THAT WOULD DECREASE OVER TIME SO THAT WOULD BE A MECHANISM BY WHICH BUILDINGS WOULD HAVE THE [INDISCERNIBLE] THAT'S AN IMPORTANT BOTH THE ELEMENT BUT JUST AS IMPORTANT ARE HAVING THE SUPPORT STRUCTURES AND THE RESOURCES THERE TO SUPPORT THE CARBONIZATION WORK. SO COLLABORATION WE HAVE WITH THE GREEN RIBBON COMMISSION AND A NUMBER OF OTHER ORGANIZATIONS SUCH AS [INDISCERNIBLE] RIGHT NOW FOR SOME EXISTING BUILDINGS THAT REPRESENT THE BUILDING STOCK [INDISCERNIBLE] AND UNDERSTAND WHAT WOULD IT REALLY TAKE TO [INDISCERNIBLE] OVER TIME TESTS TO DECARBONIZE TO UNDERSTAND WHAT IS THE PROVEN TECHNOLOGY THAT A LOT OF INFORMATION UP THERE TODAY IN THE ARCHITECT AND ENGINEER'S EXPERTISE WHERE THE FINANCING WORKS. HOW AGGRESSIVELY CAN THE CARBONIZATION HAPPEN IN THOSE BUILDINGS AND WHAT ARE THE SUPPORT OF PROGRAMS NEEDED. SO THESE ARE A NUMBER OF [INDISCERNIBLE] AND GIVE YOU A LOT MORE DETAILS AFTERWARDS THAT'S HELPFUL TO UNDERSTAND THE DETAILS OF THOSE PROCESSES SO THAT WE CAN BUILD THOSE SUPPORTIVE NETWORKS AND PROGRAMS. JUST BRIEFLY ON HISTORIC BUILDINGS, WE UNDERSTAND [INDISCERNIBLE] PRESENT ANY CHALLENGES BUT ALSO [INDISCERNIBLE] COMMUNITIES IN THE DECARBON TO MAINTAIN

EXISTING BUILDINGS AND EMBODY

SO WE'RE WORKING VERY CLOSELY
