He explained that, pursuant to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Executive Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law, that the public hearing was being conducted virtually via the online meeting platform Zoom in order to review Design Review applications. He also briefly explained how to participate in the online hearing. Alison Pultinas from the Fenway News was present.

Following this brief introduction he called the first Design Review application.

Proposed Work:Improvements to the Mall at Charlesgate West & Restoration & Improvements to pedestal and new lighting at the Vendome Memorial.

PROJECT REPRESENTATIVES: Cassie Bethoney and Amy Linne were the project representatives. They presented the proposed scope of work to the Commission, which includes alterations to the Mall at Charlesgate West.

DOCUMENTS PRESENTED: Documents presented included a project schedule and funding document, historical images of the site, a site analysis rendering, images of existing condition, a community engagement timeline, the preferred site plan and materials, pavers precedents and details, proposed seating areas, site furnishings, preferred interpretive signage, a proposed view rendering, an existing plant palette, a proposed tree palette, and a proposed planting bed palette.

DISCUSSION TOPICS: Discussion topics included an overview of the licensing agreement with the MBTA, the Boston Parks request for funding the park's construction, an overview of the projects timeline, an overview of the site's history and significance, the location of the Kenmore Square and the Mall, a summary of feedback from the community, the City of Boston Arts Commission, and the Boston Landmarks Commission, how feedback received was incorporated into the revised proposal, the street views from the Mall, the existing conditions of the site, plans to relocate the existing Lombard lamp, an overview of the project's coordination with the current Charlesgate project, replacement paving patterns, plans to protect the existing green space in the Mall, an overview of the existing and appropriate planting types and native species from the Mall, new tree additions, proposed planting and material palette, the plans to maintain the existing and proposed greenery, whether pathways are ADA compliant, proposed seating area and benches, the possibility of incorporating interpretive signage throughout the park, whether new lighting features for pedestrian lighting would be feasible, the Mall plan layout, the proposed materials for pathways, seating, and gathering areas, the proposed scheme from the seating and picnic area, existing and proposed perimeter fencing, the visual impact of the project.



Comment and discussion period, the following topics were discussed in greater detail: the visual corridor from Kenmore Square to the Mall, the possibility of pulling the benches away from the visual access line, the color, material, and dimensions of the proposed symbolic train tracks in the pavement, whether the applicant explore the possibility of incorporating actual train rails, alternative materials for the proposed train tracks, examples of embedded rails in the pavement in Boston, whether the plants would have enough space between the pavement and perimeter fence, the proposed plant arrangements, the proposed granite block seating, whether there would be new interpretive signage that discusses the connection between Kenmore Square and the Mall, the possibility of future lighting for this project.

DOCUMENTS PRESENTED: Documents presented included an overview of the project partners, project timeline, locus plan, memorial significance, existing site conditions, existing pavers, bench, and lights, memorial sculpture joints, lawn and asphalt condition, a proposed design, lighting fixture mock-up, in-ground fixture layout, and types, existing and proposed curb and paver design plan layout, proposed section cut, and proposed electrical components.

DISCUSSION TOPICS: Discussion topics included an overview of the projects aim to revitalize and improve the memorial dedicated to commemorating the lives lost in the fire at Hotel Vendome in 1972, the history of the memorials dedication, the significance of the memorial to the firefighting community, proposal to maintain the memorials original design, the sites existing condition, the proposed lighting layout, the curb and paver design and proposed electrical component, a summary of community feedback and recommendations, the projects preferred timeline, the location of the memorial and the former Hotel Vendome, the material of the existing plaza, current issues with the existing pavers, an overview of the maintenance required for the site, the current challenges to become ADA compliant, accessibility plans, the material of the existing and proposed pavers, deterioration of existing mortar, drainage issues, the installation of new electrical conduits, an overview of the new lighting fixtures and lighting mock up, location of the proposed lighting on the memorial walls, plans to protect existing greenery, new curb additions, proposed statue improvements, pathway repairs, the patterning on the pavers, the accessibility plans.

- Suggest that there be dimming capabilities for these lights
- That mock ups of the final design for lights will be submitted to staff.
- Make sure that the bench that little curve section is going to be will stand out in some way so that it won't be a tripping hazard.

Elaine Donovan, the Charlestown Liaison for Boston City Councilor Gabriela Coletta's office spoke in support of the proposed designation.

Ron Kulich, spoke in support of the proposed study report and designation and offered additional information about the project.

Kent Edwards Loren, offered comments regarding the Zoom protocols for BLC meetings.

Chair Brad Walker stated the public comment period will end on March 29, 2024.

The Chair announced that the Commission would next review the Advisory Review application.

IV. ADVISORY REVIEW

ADDRESS: CHESTNUT HILL PUMPING STATION

Proposed Work: Review of work at smoke stack.

PROJECT REPRESENTATIVES: James Gallagher, Mike Hughes, Doug Kelleher, Laurence Ronan, Martin Perlmutter were the project representatives. They presented the proposed scope of work to the Commission, which includes an overview of the proposal for work at the smokestack at the Chestnut Hill Pumping Station.

DOCUMENTS PRESENTED: Documents presented included existing conditions, smokestack adjacencies, the impact radius of smokestack failure, the historical background, the historic designation, the regulatory context, maintenance activities, original drawings, and elevations, structural performance analysis and results, mortar strength, and building influence, and the probability of a seismic event causing failure.

DISCUSSION TOPICS: Discussion topics included an overview of the historical background of the site and its landmark designation, regulatory context, preventative maintenance measures, existing conditions, safety and structural



issues with the smoke stack, other masonry structures that have similar safety issues, proposal to dismantle and remove the smoke stack in the interest of public safety, whether the smoke stack could be repaired and restored, the impact a seismic event could have on the smokestacks, the public safety risk associated with not removing the smokestacks, the costs associated with preventive maintenance on the slate roof and other repairs.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS: During the Commissioner Comment and discussion period, the following topics were discussed in greater detail: whether the applicants assessed the significance of the smokestack and the impact its removal would have on the site and the community, the possibility of exploring other alternatives to demolition, whether the applicant could examine the possibility of a full reconstruction of the site if the applicant could provide a linear scan, digital model, and photographs of the site for the historical records, and the potential cost to restore the smokestack. Commissioners also commented that the Boston Landmarks Commission would never make a decision that would compromise public safety.

V. CLARIFICATION ITEMS

Chief Mariama White-Hammond offered comments as a precursor to the Office of Historic Preservation presentation that Director Murray Miller presented. Chief White-Hammond offered comments in support of the vision and provided an overview of the history of the Office of Historic Preservation. Additionally, comments were offered concerning the progress and initiatives made by the Commemoration Commission, the Archeology Department, and the Landmarks Commission.

VI. OFFICE OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION - VISION PRESENTATION

Murray Miller, the Director of the Office of Historic Preservation, provided an updated version of the Office of Historic Preservation Vision Presentation. The presentation entailed an overview of Boston's history, the office priorities and functions, a summary of community feedback, changes to the vision based on community feedback, and the vision proposal.

PUBLIC COMMENT: During the public comment period, the following participants spoke;

James Berkman, mentioned that there have been consistent concerns regarding the vision statement and wanted to know if the vision would be revised based on community



feedback.

Kent Edwards Loren, offered comments regarding the vision's landmark designation process.

Serge Savard, offered comments regarding the development of a historic preservation ordinance.

Susan Prindle, offered comments regarding the expansion of the initiatives of the new vision and the potential costs associated with the expansion.

Martha Brest, expressed concern with how the Office of Historic Preservation dealt with community feedback regarding the vision.
