

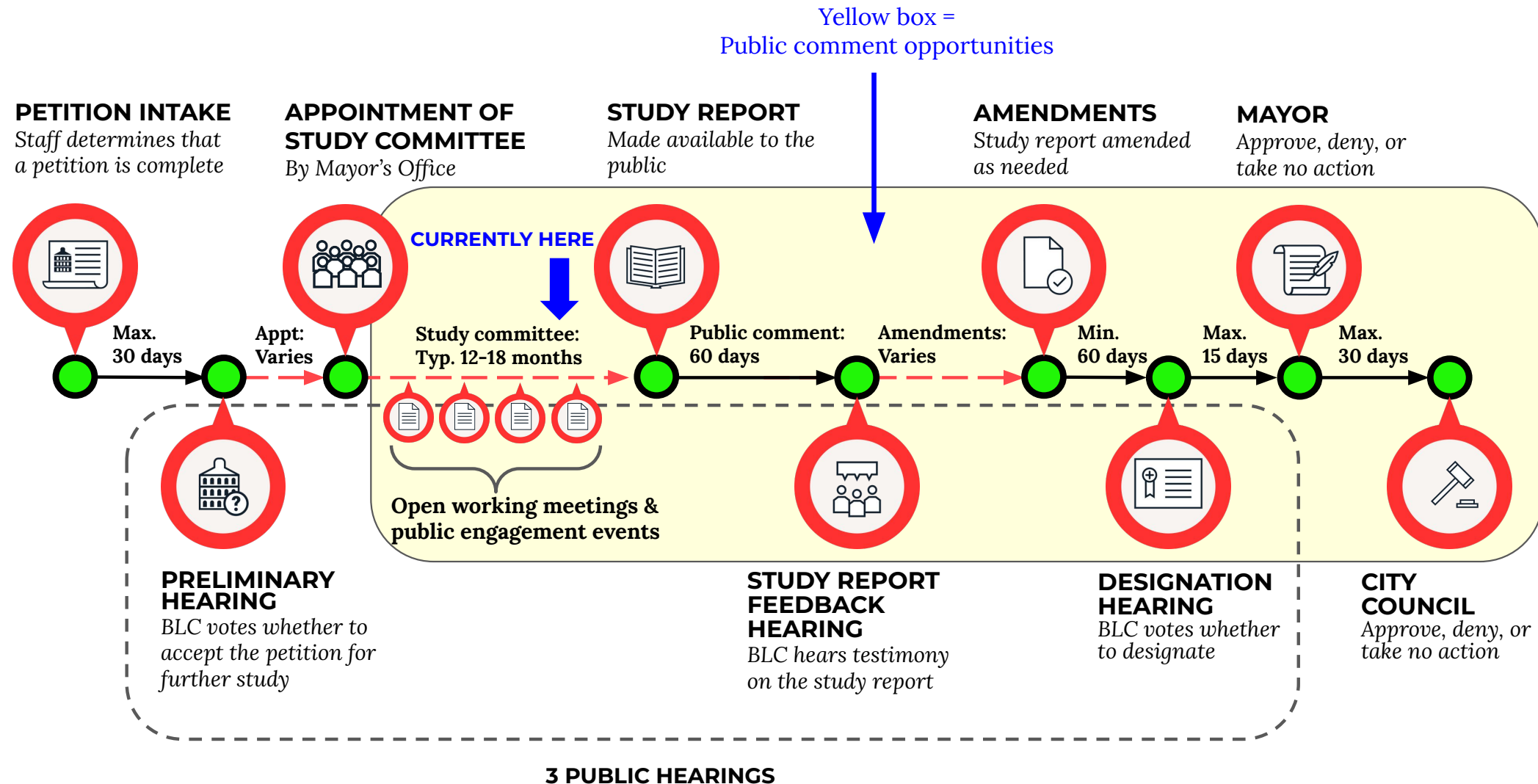

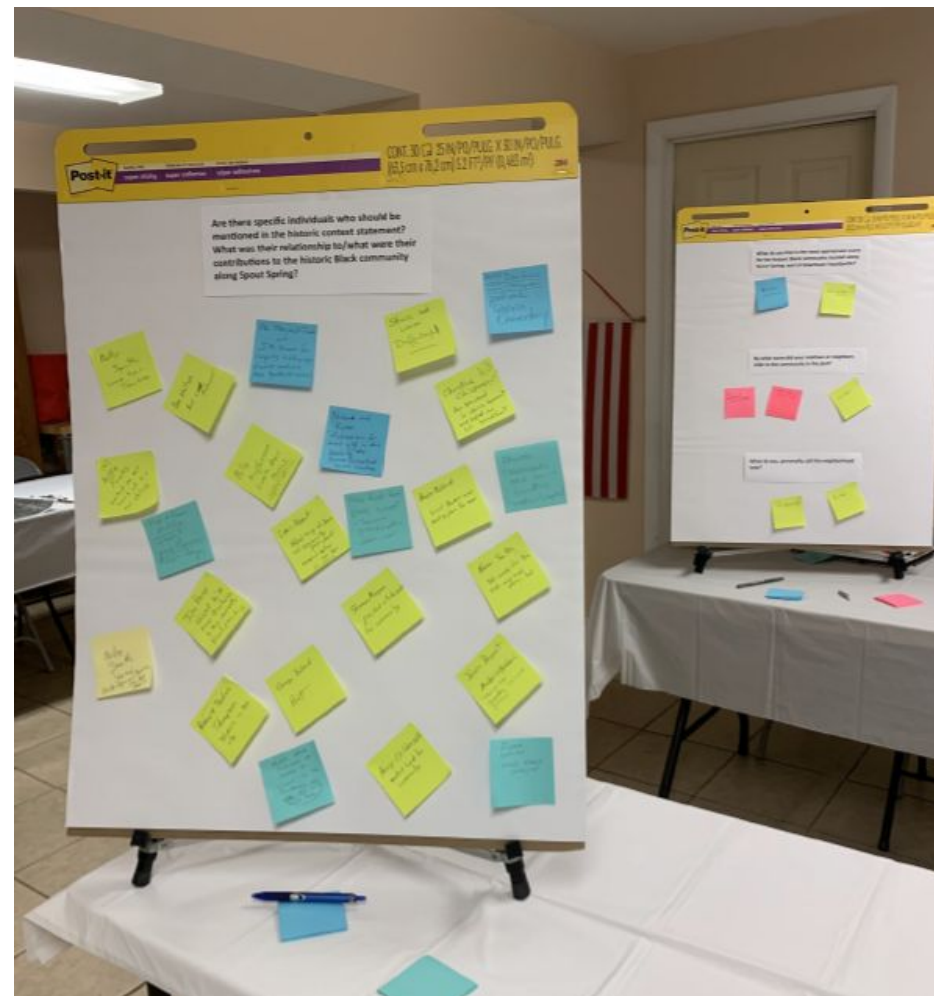

 - b. **One-page map/comment sheets:** Attendees can draw other alternative boundaries and provide comments.



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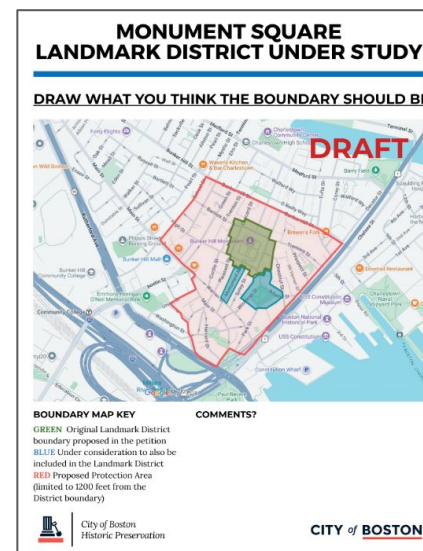
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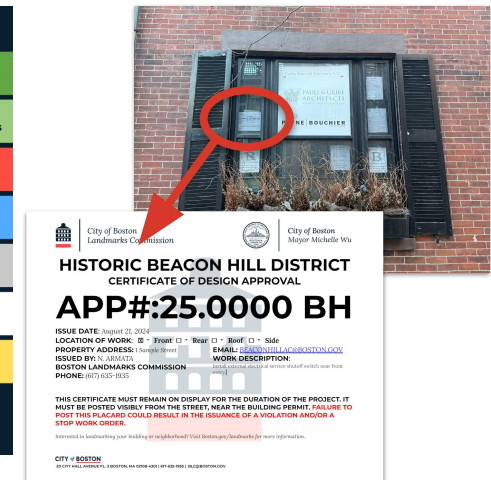
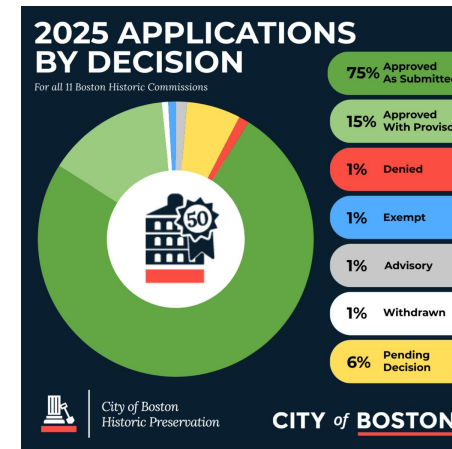
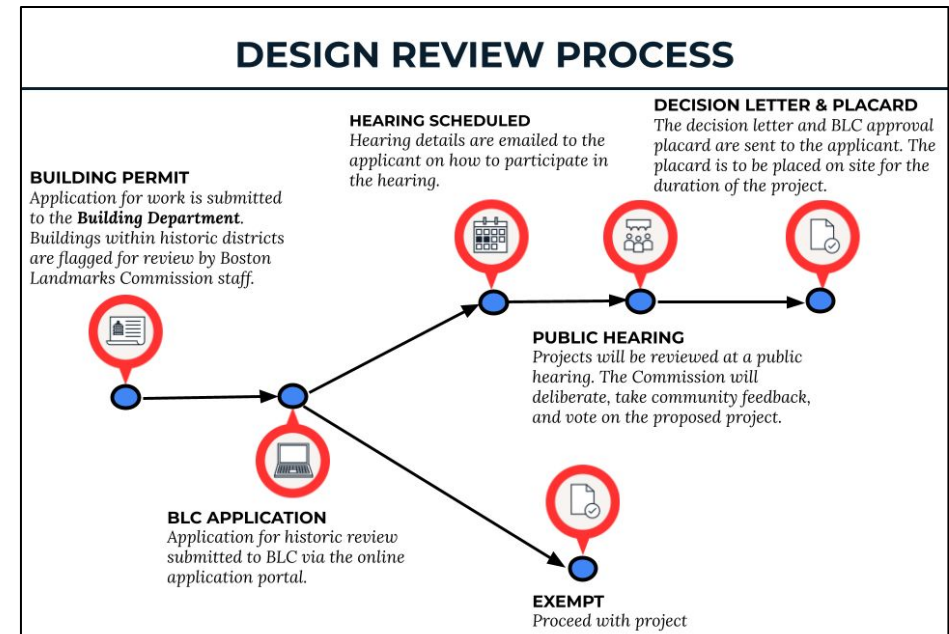

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Monument Square Landmark District FAQs

Q: What is the Monument Square Landmark District Study Committee and why does it exist?

In 2022, the Boston Landmarks Commission accepted a petition from Charlestown residents to study the creation of a Monument Square Landmark District in Charlestown. The Study Committee was appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council to review the historic, architectural, and archaeological significance of the properties in and around Monument Square. The Study Committee's main job is to evaluate and recommend boundaries and standards that could guide future design review should a district be designated.

Q: What is a Landmark District and what is a Protection Area?

A: Chapter 772 of the Acts of 1975 (the law that created the Boston Landmarks Commission), defines a Landmark District as:

an area containing any physical features or improvements or both which are of historical, social, cultural, architectural or aesthetic significance to the city and the commonwealth, the New England region or the nation and cause such area to constitute a distinctive section of the city.

A Protection Area is defined as:

an area which is contiguous to and constitutes an essential part of the physical environment of any architectural conservation district, landmark or landmark district.

There is a substantial difference in level of regulation between the two. A Landmark District can require design review for exterior alterations (see below). In a Protection Area, only demolition, land coverage, structure height, landscape, and topography can be regulated.

Q: Is there going to be a Landmark District and Protection Area established? What is the timeline, and when can I comment?

A: That is still to be determined. The Study Committee has concluded that the areas shown on [this map](#) do meet the criteria for a Landmark District and Protection Area based on (1) their review of the initial petition, (2), their study of the historic, architectural, and archaeological significance of the area, and (3) the public feedback collected at two neighborhood walks and a community meeting held in Charlestown as well as the committee's working meetings, numerous emails, conversations at public events, and other avenues. As of September 22, 2026, they have released a working study report for the public to review and comment on the draft recommendations. Another community meeting will be held on October 21, 2026. The study report will then be updated based on public input.

4.4.6 Windows

Character-defining features include:
• Lintels and sills • Window hoods • Shutters • Muntin patterns

Requirements
1. Character-defining windows and arrangements of window openings shall be retained. 2. Enlarging or reducing original window openings for the purpose of fitting stock (larger or smaller) window sash or air conditioners shall not be allowed. 3. Character-defining window sash, elements, features (functional and decorative), details, and ornamentation shall be retained and, if necessary, repaired by patching, splicing, consolidating, or otherwise reinforcing using recognized preservation methods. 4. Deteriorated character-defining window sash, elements, features (functional and decorative), details, and ornamentation or missing components of window features shall be replaced with material and elements that match the original in material, color, texture, size, shape, profile, configuration, and detail of installation. If using the same material is not technically or economically feasible, then compatible substitute materials may be considered on a case-by-case basis.



Recommendations and Advice
5. Exterior combination storm windows should have a narrow perimeter framing that does not obscure the glazing of the primary window. In addition, the meeting rail of the combination storm window shall align with that of the primary window. 6. Storm window sashes and frames should have a painted finish that matches the primary window sash and frame color. 7. Applied exterior muntins with internal spacer bars are preferable to internal spacer bars only. 8. Muntin patterns should match the original era and style of the building. 9. Low-e glass without a tint is preferable to tinted glass. 10. Shutters should be wide enough to represent true coverage of the window.
